Old Gaffers Association join us. In return, our members have been invited to a Classic Yacht Association of Australia regatta to be held on Melbourne's Port Philip Bay this November.

By encouraging contacts with overseas classic associations, we are able to further the interest in classic vessels on a worldwide basis as well as experience classic boating in different countries. Lindauer Classic Yacht Regatta: Once again we had a fabulous event for both launches and yachts with thanks to our Sponsorship Manager, Tony Stevenson, Secretary Joyce Talbot and Race Officer Chris Collins. Special thanks are also due to Dick and Colleen Fisher for the use of their beautiful Akarana as mothership. Launch/Yacht Activities: Under the guidance of Ian Gavin, our Club Captain Launches, we have had a very successful launching season, with the introduction of a log rally series, similar to the yachting series.

A race for the Rudder Cup, last held in 1908, the course for which is around Sail Rock and return, is now in the planning stages and will be a major event for the Association in 2008.

After a proposal by John Street and championed by Baden Pascoe, the Auckland Anniversary Regatta included a race for tugs, which became a highlight of the regatta and will become a regatta fixture in future years.

On the yachting front, it was very pleasing to see the increase in the number of yachts racing in the "B" Division. This was due in no small part to the leadership of our Club Captain Yachts, Jason Prew.

In response to members' support at the Boat Owners meeting, we have now divided the race series into two sections, a Harbour Race Series and a Passage Race Series. Both series will consist of six races and this new format will be instituted this coming season.

Tank Farm Proposal: Your association is involved in a submission, very ably led by Baden Pascoe, to the Tank Farm development and if successful will give us a marina area in the new development for a permanent 'on the water' public display of some of our classic vessels.

Social Nights: Our members' evenings have been well attended this year. Highlights for me have been the talks by John Lidgard, Frank Warnock and the 'classic' talk by Andrew Fagan on his single handed exploits.

Membership: Our membership has remained

Season's winners celebrate

The Classic Yacht Association of New Zealand congratulated the winners of the season after increased numbers of competitors saw some great racing throughout the summer.

Warren Tuohey and his crew on *Katrina II* won the Logan Cup for the A Division, the second year in a row. She is the first classic to win the Points Series back to back; a great tribute to Bob Stewart, the designer and Warren and his band of merry men.

In the B Division, Jason Prew, now the proud new owner of *Loloma*, has turned this small gaffer into a rocketship flying a new topsail, a water sail (on occasions) and anything else that can propel this little ship. She was a well-deserving winner of the Robert Logan Trophy.

In the Modern Classic Division, Michael Good in Sequoiah (pictured below), a 1969 40ft John Spencer designed and built flyer, proved to be the most



consistent performer this season, winning the Bob Stewart Cup.

The launches enjoyed their second season of rallying with *Florence Dawn*, owned by Ian and Kathy Gavin, taking the Viking Clock prize.

The #8 Buoy Trophy for the most memorable navigational error went to *Spray II*, which took a major diversion on the way to Te Kouma, flying the spinnaker from the masthead, with the crew wondering how to retrieve it before landfall at Great Barrier. And this year's winner of the *Prize* Tiller for the most wins went to *Tawera*.

Chairman Tony Blake was unable to be with us and gave his speech via a DVD. In doing so the highlights of the season, namely the launch rally to Riverhead, the hospitality of the Woolcotts at the Patio Bay Rally, the spectacle of the Mahurangi Festival, the first Tug Boat Race during the Anniversary Day Regatta, the contrasts of the sailing conditions in the Lindauer Regatta, the sunset at Te Kouma and the camaraderie at Islington Bay were recalled.

As the format and style of classic yachting in New Zealand is changing, the Association is growing from strength to strength. We are all enjoying the companionship of likeminded yachties everywhere and of every persuasion.

John Street the owner of the classic 1920's ex Harbour Board towing launch TeHauraki mentioned in passing that he was thinking of having a duel with the 1935 ex AHB steam tug William C. Daldy at the next Auckland Anniversary Regatta. My response was, "Why not include all the other retired and operating tugs around the harbour?" I had this image of a line-up of tugs and towboats from the early ages through to the very latest in tug technology.
