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Patio Bay Race

The Patio Bay Race was once again one of the races of the season. Starting in a light southwesterly with a long line stretching from Torpedo Buoy to Orakei Buoy, Sapphire at the Torpedo end picked up a narrow channel of wind and took off at the head of the fleet.

Tawera decided to 'go slow' by having one of the crew fall overboard and be dragged behind until eventually pulled back on board. The incident must have been caused by the abrupt acceleration once their spinnaker filled.

However Tawera then led for the rest of the race to claim both line and handicap honours. She made such a quick trip that Paramour, the finish boat, was still unloading gear at the Patio Bay beach when Tawera hove into sight. Arcturus set a large fisherman's staysail and was never challenged for second on line and handicap. The close action throughout race was between

Sapphire, Katrina, Waitangi and Sequoiah. Sapphire maintained her lead on the other three right down to the Three Sisters.

Katrina, Waitangi, and Sequoiah had a great tussle as both Waitangi and Sequioah continually attempted to pass Katrina to windward but lacked that extra bit of boat speed. However as the wind

freshened to 20 knots and moved further aft Waitangi's spread of canvas and longer waterline began to make a difference and she passed Katrina to leeward and then Sapphire to windward. Just before the finish it was necessary to gybe Waitangi and with gusts approaching 25 knots we had to wait for a lull. Even then we put the

main boom in the water and had a crew member receive a rope burn. *Sapphire, Katrina* and *Sequioah* finished shortly after.

It was interesting to notice, during the race, the lack of effort required to helm the more modern yachts compared to *Waitangi*. On

For once the southwesterly wind did not die down in the evening and it was a challenge to get off the beach in the dinghies through the surf.

That southwesterly picked up to a solid 30 knots on the sail back to Auckland, necessitating two reefs in *Waitangi's* mainsail. However, we managed to lay through from the Three Sisters and had a thoroughly enjoyable sail, though keeping

a close eye on *Katrina* and *Arcturus* both of whom closed in on *Waitangi* as we neared Browns Island.

What a great weekend of sailing and conviviality!
