Fortunately, there has been a big survival rate in Ks. Gary Vincent and Michele Sigerist of *Jenanne* proved to be the catalysts by organising a successful K Class event at North Cove, Kawau, on 7-9 March.

Jenanne was joined there by Doug Reid and Alan Brown in Sapphire, Robert and Anne Leydon in Thelma, Katrina II with owners Warren and Marlene Tuohey in attendance on their launch Guardian as mother ship and drinks platform. Finally by John and Susie Rawson in Kitenui. Already in North Cove was local resident John Pryor's Gypsy.

So, thanks to Gary and Michele's energy, six of the remaining 11 K's were together in one place at one time.

The social occasion was understandably brilliant especially after everyone had repaired to John Pryor and Jill Hetherington's place for a barbecue in the evening.

There was a pleasant sail on the Sunday morning with the camaraderie becoming infectious. Warren Tuohey gave sailing directions over the radio to his 'K Squadron', insisting on good sail trimming, that is until it fell calm.

These superb yachts have survived to date because of their sheer merit, but this move has further guaranteed their survival into the future.

Jenanne (K2) was designed by Arnold (Bill) Couldrey



and built by Low Bros of Whangarei in 1949 for Murray Wiseman. Sapphire was designed by Olin Stephens and built by Percy Vos in 1960 for Russ Hooper. Thelma (K3) is a sister ship to Jenanne but built by Alan Williams in 1950 for Claude Edwards. Katrina II was designed by Bob Stewart and built in 1957 by Percy Vos for Jim Faire. Kitenui (K5) was designed and built

by Colin Wild in 1950 for Dick Ross while *Gypsy* (K4) was designed by Arch Logan and originally built as a gaff-rigged C Class by Bill Couldrey for Alan Leyland in 1939.

• Post-script – Since the March sail-in, John Pryor and Jill Hetherington bought *Kiariki* (K11), designed by Jack Brooke for himself and built by his son-in-law John Salthouse in 1959.
